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Steps You Can Take to Avoid Sweatshop Toys

Labour advocates in China are not calling on people to stop buying toys from overseas factories. They argue that a boycott will not improve working conditions — but will cost factory workers their jobs.

Here are some of their suggestions on what people in Canada can do to improve the lot of toy factory workers:

- When you shop for toys, ask the store manager whether companies or their suppliers have signed a code of conduct and whether they have agreed to monitoring of toy factories by independent, local human rights monitors.
- Ask that your concerns be passed on to the head office.
- If the company assures you it doesn't tolerate human rights or labour abuses, ask to see a copy of its code of conduct.
- If the code does not contain provisions for a living wage and protect human rights, then ask: Why not?
- Check to see who monitors the code to ensure compliance.
- Ask how consumers can get information about where and how products are produced.
- You can also contact the Toy Manufacturers of America [now the Toy Industry Association] requesting the establishment of an independent monitoring system for their code of conduct, which guarantees workers the right to organize a union and bargain collectively.
- Labour groups want to pressure the federal government to insist that trade deals include labour standards. They're also suggesting toys that come into this country should have a stamp or a label that proves the toy was made under ethical conditions.
